After Judah too was defeated, its king tortured, and its temple desecrated, the main compiler of Deuteronomy, possibly Baruch, the secretary to the prophet Jeremiah, re-edited the document to the form in which we have it, reflecting expectations of a more eternal and universal fulfillment of God's Messianic promises, as later accepted also by Christians and Muslims. Baruch may have also produced Joshua, Judges, I & II Samuel (the Northern prophet/priest) and I and II Kings (monarchs North & South, good and bad). R The Return from exile of the Jewish aristocracy, priesthood and civil service, to rejoin the farmers, Levites and others left behind required a unified vision to rebuild Jerusalem, the temple and a functioning state of Judah. Ezra, as "redactor" edited the four sets of documents above into
- one compendium, modeling on the success of JE, but with a brilliance that earned him the appellation "The Second Moses." His work, the most intricate masterpiece in world literature until now, was accepted so completely that for over two thousand years people took the compendium known as the Pentateuch to be by one author, namely Moses himself, who actually lived 500 years before there was a written form of Hebrew. Ezra's work, the Jewish Torah, as the foundation of that culture, and of hundreds of national cultures since then, now takes its place as a foundational cornerstone of our emerging world culture. The "documentary hypothesis" of the origins of the Pentateuch has become

documentary evidence, so much greater than the sum of its parts, and entirely worthy of the appellation, "The Word of God."
